Approval of the minutes for the February 24, 2021 regularly scheduled Board Meeting.

Item A-1 Recommendation to Approve the Consent to Potential Assignment of Lease to Sheltair Melbourne II, LLC.

Sheltair Melbourne II, LLC is purchasing the assets and certain liabilities of Apex Executive Jet, including the 13.068-acre lease at 140 S. Apollo Boulevard with plans to continue to operate as a Fixed Based Operator (FBO) business. The closing is scheduled to take place in April 2021. Sheltair Aviation is well known in the general and corporate aviation industries as an owner and operator of 18 FBOs throughout the United States. It also manages more than four million square feet of aviation related properties.

Sheltair is an existing tenant at MLB and currently leases over 31 acres on the northside of the Airport. As part of the due diligence process, all financial and transactional documents have been reviewed by staff as well as the Melbourne Airport Authority attorney. In addition, the Airport Authority attorney has been in contact with the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) regarding the sale and assignment.

Staff recommends approval of the Consent to Potential Assignment of Lease to Sheltair Melbourne II, LLC and authorization for the Executive Director to execute said Consent on behalf of the Authority, contingent on FAA approval.

Item A-2 Recommendation for Approval of Resolution 3-21 to Approve a Budget Increase of \$27,000,000 (Overall Project Budget of \$61,000,000) for the Terminal Renovation and Expansion Project to Expand and Modernize the Facilities Needed for Air Service Development.

The current terminal building is over 30 years old and needs an update to both the infrastructure and the public-facing areas. The current facilities are also undersized and inadequate to serve the aircraft type as well as the expected increase in new customers that the Airport expects once TUI commences Melbourne service in 2022.

This project is critical in providing the Airport the infrastructure needed to take the next step in its air service development efforts. By updating and expanding the terminal and related facilities, the Airport will be well positioned to not only accommodate the new air service with TUI, but to enhance the travel experience of Delta Air Lines and American Airlines customers. Additionally, having a modern facility will assist in the Airport's air service development efforts.

The current approved budget for the Terminal Renovation and Expansion Project is \$34,000,000 funded entirely with Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) grants. The budget amendment will increase the budget to \$61,000,000 and modify the budgeted funding sources to align with Airport management's funding plan which is a combination of FAA grants, Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) grants, and Airport cash reserves.

- FAA-Terminal Rehab Phase 1-\$6,895,959 (approval 9/2/20); 0% match
- FAA-Terminal Rehab Phase 2-\$4,444,444 (approval 9/2/20); 0% match
- FAA-Ramp Rehab/Expansion-\$6,000,000 (approval 9/2/20); 0% match
- FDOT-Ramp Rehab/Expansion-\$5,000,000 (approval 1/27/21); 0% match (DRA-Deferred Reimb) The Airport will fund the project out of reserves in FY 21 and the reimbursement from FDOT will be received from September 2022 through December 2025 as defined in the grant agreement.

A budget amendment is required to increase the overall budget for the project and to align the grant revenue and local funds with expected funding sources for the project. Staff recommends a transfer from prior year surplus for the local funds that will be used for the project. The total increase to the Capital Projects Fund will be \$27,000,000.

Staff recommends approval of the attached budget amendment and establishment of a parent project, titled "Terminal Renovation and Expansion-Public Space", in the amount of \$27,000,000 with sub-projects to be established as the scope of work is more clearly defined as the project proceeds, and authorization for the Chairman to execute said resolution on behalf of the Authority.

Recommendation for Approval of Resolution 4-21 to Approve a Loan Commitment and Related Loan Documentation from Truist Bank in an Amount Not-to-Exceed \$9,000,000 for the Terminal Renovation and Expansion Project to Expand and Modernize the Facilities Needed for Air Service Development and Requesting and Recommending that the City of Melbourne Issue Such Debt to Finance the Project.

As part of the funding plan described in Item A-2 to renovate and expand the terminal facilites, it is proposed to finance \$9,000,000 of it with debt. To that end, Airport staff and PFM Financial Advisors LLC, the Airport's Financial Advisor, requested and received a loan commitment from Truist Bank in an amount not to exceed \$9,000,000, amortizing over 10 years and bearing interest at a taxable fixed rate of 1.95 percent and repayable from the Airport's net operating revenues and other legally available funds, such as, Passenger Facility Charges (PFCs).

Staff recommends approval of the Loan Commitment and the forms of the Loan Agreement, Escrow Agreement and Airport Agreement Regarding Borrowings that are attached to the Resolution and requesting and recommending that the City borrow funds pursuant to the Loan Commitment for the terminal renovation and expansion, and authorization for the Chairman to execute said resolution on behalf of the Authority.

Item A-4 Recommendation for Approval of Resolution 5-21 to Approve the Addition of a New Capital Project and to Establish a Budget of \$1,024,944 for the Design of an In-line Baggage System Needed to Accommodate Passenger Growth.

The number of passengers at the Airport is expected to grow significantly due to new air service from airlines such as TUI, which is expected to add at least 109,000 enplanements annually. The existing manual baggage screening system is inadequate to process the expected increase in bags through the Transportation Security Administration (TSA) screening process in an acceptable amount of time. Accordingly, the Airport has worked with the existing terminal design contractor, Haskell, and the TSA to design and fund a new inline baggage system.

The in-line baggage screening system, coupled with the modifications to the terminal from the terminal renovation and expansion project, will enable checked bags to be screened efficiently with little manual contact. There are two phases to this project: the design phase and the construction phase. Both phases are expected to last a year. The construction portion of the budget will be brought forward next year as a separate budget amendment once the cost estimate is complete.

Airport staff has applied for TSA funding for both phases of the project, with 95 percent of the eligible space to be funded by the TSA, with the grant/other transaction agreement (OTA). TSA has indicated that funding will be awarded, this will be presented to the Board once the OTA is awarded. The Capital Projects Fund will increase \$1,024,944 for the design portion of the in-line baggage system project:

A budget amendment is required to appropriate the grant revenue and MAA matching portion as well as to approve the expenditure for the project. Staff recommends approval of the attached budget amendment and establishment of a project, titled "In-line Baggage System", with a design budget in the amount of \$1,024,944, and authorization for the Chairman to execute said resolution on behalf of the Authority.

Item A-5 Recommendation to Award the Next Phase of Work to The Haskell Company/RS&H/Kinley Team under Its Progressive Design/Build Contract for Package 1A (Security Checkpoint and Hold Room Foundations and Structure) of the Terminal Renovation and Expansion Project for the Guaranteed Maximum Price (GMP) of \$9,872,715.

As part of the Terminal Renovation and Expansion Project, the phasing of the work is divided into packages to meet the different funding requirements and to define specific scopes of work to allow individual areas to be completed independent of others.

This scope is to expand the terminal for the new security checkpoint on the ground level and create the new hold rooms on the second floor. This scope is an early package for foundations and structure (steel) only. This will allow the work to begin within the next couple of weeks while the rest of the design for this area is completed and a GMP is established.

Staff recommends approval of the award to The Haskell Company/RS&H/Kinley for Package 1A (Security Checkpoint and Hold Room Foundations and Structure) of the Progressive Design/Build of the Terminal Renovation and Expansion Project for the Guaranteed Maximum Price of \$9,872,715 and authorization for the Executive Director to execute said agreement on behalf of Authority.

Gate use fees charged to airlines is a large component of this revenue. Gate use fees are assessed based on usage and, due to the parata began in March 2020 followed by reductions in flights from scheduled carriers, revenue has decreased compared to prior year.
