Approval of the minutes of the January 25, 2019 meeting in the Orlando Melbourne International Airport Board Room.

Item A-1 Recommendation to approve a contract with netDirective Technologies, Inc., d/b/a Artemis for complete Professional Managed Information Technology (IT) Services.

In February 2018, the Board approved a one-year contract to ensure IT operations continued with little or no disruption following the retirement of the Airport's IT Manager.

Staff developed an IT Management Plan and issued a competitive Request for Proposals seeking a long-term Information Technology support company to provide these services. Staff solicited 22 Managed IT companies and received seven proposals. Proposals were evaluated on a Best-Value basis with the following criteria: Qualifications and Staffing, Relevant Experience, Ability to Meet Authority Needs, Pricing/Rates, References/Past Performance, and Compliance with RFP Requirements. The following chart displays the evaluation scoring results:

The contract provides complete Professional Managed Information Technology Services. Services include 24-hour support for IT solutions to the airport to include management of all hardware, software, and phone systems. Also included is a full-time onsite IT Field Service Technician. The estimated cost is in line with Staff's projected cost analysis. Staff recommends approval of a contract with Artemis, for complete Professional Managed Information Technology Services for \$620,022 for 5 years with a 3-year Base and 2-year Option Period (contract years 2-5 escalated at 3 percent each year for total cost

estimate). Year 1 pricing is \$9,732 per month. Staff recommends approval of a contract with Artemis and authorization for the Executive Director to execute said contract on behalf of the Authority.

Item A-2 Approval of an Option to Lease with Fallon Aviation, LLC.

Fallon Aviation, LLC (Fallon) currently owns a pilot shop located on Apollo Boulevard and is associated with Melbourne Flight School, which currently operates out of the Sheltair facility on the Northside. Both businesses are experiencing tremendous growth that requires bigger accommodations. Fallon plans to construct a shared-use facility.

Due to infrastructure to the current tower, if Fallon were to begin construction today, that infrastructure would have to be relocated. Since that tower will be decommissioned and demolished, both the Airport and Fallon agree it would be more fiscally and operationally prudent to delay entering into a lease until they can reasonably begin construction.

The salient points of the Option are as follows:

Option Parcel Size:

±7.3 acres

Option Period:

Six months with a six-month extension

Cost of Option:

\$3,000 per six-month period

Broker Fee:

No broker fee

Staff recommends approval of the Option to Lease with Fallon Aviation, LLC and authorization for the Executive Director to execute said Option on the behalf of the Authority.

Item A-3 Approval of an Option to Lease with Health First, Inc.

First Flight is the emergency helicopter transport service of Health First, Inc. (Health First). Based at Holmes Regional Medical Center, First Flight is Brevard County's only air ambulance and has been serving East Central Florida since 1988. Health First currently leases a facility for the helicopter and flight crew that no longer meets their needs.

Due to Health First's fiscal schedule it would not be able to enter into a lease until later this year, however it wants to preserve a right to lease this parcel.

The salient points of the Option are as follows:

Cost of Option:

\$5,799.42 for the nine-month period

Broker Fee:

Staff recommends approval of the Option to Lease with Health First, Inc. and authorization for the Executive Director to execute said Option on the behalf of the Authority.

Item A-4 Recommendation for Approval of Final Change Order No. 5 to Preferred Materials, Inc. for the Runway 9R-27L Mill and Overlay project in the deductive amount of \$69,844.00.

In June of 2017, the Board approved the lowest responsive bid for the Runway 9R-27L Mill and Overlay project to Preferred Materials, Inc. in the amount of \$20,497,329 contingent upon receiving the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) Airport Improvement Program (AIP) discretionary entitlement funding for the project. In October of 2017, FAA informed the Airport Authority (MLB) that certain line items within the bid no longer qualified for discretionary funding. MLB staff, along with the Engineer of Record, AVCON, met with the contractor to reduce the contract amount which was issued in Change Order No. 1 and approved by the Board in December of 2017 for a revised contract amount of \$18,884,729.

During the course of construction, several change orders were issued for additive and deductive changes, including deductions for Owner Direct Purchases (ODPs) and time extensions due to weather delays. At the completion of the project, the Engineer of Record verified quantities installed and determined that the Airport was entitled to additional savings resulting in an overall savings amount of \$261,736. The revised final contract amount is \$18,622,993.

Even though the Contractor had received additional time for weather delays, they did not complete certain milestones resulting in liquidated damages. MLB, AVCON and Preferred Materials reviewed the contractual dates and agreed to an amount of \$41,200 in liquidated damages. This brings the final contract amount to \$18,581,793.

Staff recommends approval of the final Change Order to Preferred Materials, Inc. and authorization for the Executive Director to execute said Change Order on the behalf of the Authority.

Item A-5 Recommendation to Approve an Extension of the Professional Services Agreement with Quadrex Aviation, LLC for the Air Traffic Control Tower project coordination with the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) in an amount not to exceed \$32,760.00.

In the September 2016 Board meeting, Quadrex Aviation, LLC was approved for a contract to coordinate and liaison with the FAA for the successful transfer and integration of the FAA into the new air traffic control tower. All this work was to be completed within the original time frame of construction, which was a total of 13 months. Delays from the FAA in negotiating the reimbursable agreements have extensively extended the project time. Also, the government shutdown which occurred after the agreement was signed and paid for has added more delays that staff has now been informed that the switch over to the new tower will not take place until October 2019.

Staff recommends approval of the Extension to Quadrex Aviation, LLC in an amount not to exceed \$32,760 and authorization for the Executive Director to execute said Extension on the behalf of the Authority.

There are also more contract employees in the terminal cost center needed to clean space such as the FIS which opened Summer 2018. B Increase is due to improved cutoff/processing of invoices, there were 23 invoices processed this year compared to 16 last year.

C This is an internal charge from Risk and they charge 1/12 of the budgeted premium. The increase corresponds to the increase in budgeted amount that is charged each month; increase is primarily due to new assets coming on line. D Increase is due to improved cutoff/processing of invoices (last year represents 3 month of expense vs. 4 months in current year)

E Decrease is due to cost saving measures associated with goals of improving cash position that were approved as part of fy 19 budget.

F In FY 19, lobbying costs are being charged to "lobbying expense"; in fy 18, these expenses were charged to outside counsel. This change is designed to provide better classification of expenses.

G This is due to the timing on when the Air Service Incentive is paid out, \$750k was paid out last year compared to \$0 this year as of 1/31/19.
